


VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

HELPING NEIGHBORS FACE THE FINANCIAL HARDSHIPS OF TODAY'S WORLD

A living wage is a struggle to obtain for many of the neighbors we serve. Most live paycheck to paycheck, just one unexpected expense away from falling short of meeting their financial obligations. Some are fortunate to have roofs over their heads, while others arrange short-term stays with family and friends or live in their cars. According to the "Living Wage Calculator," in Kentucky, a family of four (two adults working full-time jobs with two children) should earn an annual income of \$95,516 before taxes to have a living wage. The breakdown allows for \$991 for housing each month, which is almost impossible to find due to inflation and the low inventory of affordable housing. (Massachusetts Institute of Technology)

Almost daily, our Call Center receives requests from families that have been displaced and are searching for permanent housing. Our short-term solution is our Homeless Assistance Program (HAP) which provides a 3-night stay at a local hotel, and food and laundry facilities to families in need, with priority given to families with children. HAP offers temporary respite for families to regroup their thoughts, clean their clothes and begin working with agencies to obtain long-term housing. The goal of HAP is to provide a safe place where people without a home can establish a connection with local housing providers and lessen their time on the streets.

Recently, we started a partnership with Covington, Newport, Independence, Erlanger, Elsmere and Dayton school districts to help reach more homeless families in these districts in need of temporary shelter. We know that HAP is affordable housing, but providing a safe space for families while searching for permanent housing is important. Our Voice of the Poor (VOP) committee is a group of Vincentian continued support in our efforts to keep families safe.

volunteers dedicated to addressing the bigger issues impacting our neighbors in need. Lack of affordable housing is a key issue for them. The group meets to determine how to advocate for change to local and state policies to build more resources in our community.

As mentioned earlier, inflation impacts the lack of low-cost housing and other basic needs of those we serve. The cost of food and other household essentials has risen sharply and is expected to continue to increase. The summer months are especially hard for low-income families with school-aged children who typically would be eligible for free breakfast and lunch through school. During the summer months, many of these children forego nutritious meals because families prioritize paying rent and utilities over purchasing food with the limited funds they have. Our choice food pantries help these families by offering two visits per month to obtain food for the entire family.

Unfortunately, our pantries tend to be understocked during the summer since food drives take place primarily in the fall and winter months. We are asking for food donations throughout the summer. Donations can be dropped off at our Erlanger location, 2655 Crescent Springs Road. The struggles our neighbors in need face daily are challenging but we are here to help them move toward stability. ST. CECILIA CONFERENCE SPOTLIGHT



St. Cecilia is one of the 29 SVdPNKY Conferences located in Independence, Ky. This group of devoted Vincentians has made significant progress in the last few years. Their new food pantry, only a year old, allows them to stock more food to better serve neighbors in need. They keep their pantry stocked with the help of the Knights of Columbus and their dedicated parishioners.

Before COVID, the community's most significant need was food for families but now they are finding many neighbors are in need of food, rent and utility assistance. St. Cecilia's Vincentians go on home visits every week, often finding themselves on dirt roads and narrow, rocky hills where they find homes in poor conditions. They were unaware that these streets existed and surprised that they were within a mile of their own homes.

Pam reached out to us through our Call Center and was assigned to St. Cecilia Conference. She shared that she and her son, both disabled due to car accidents, were living in a trailer with no power. They applied for social security disability but the wait time is several months. During the home visit, St. Cecilia members discovered Pam and her son cooked on a grill outside and used old two-by-four wood pieces because they

couldn't afford charcoal. Members were able to deliver food and propane to fuel their grill. St. Cecilia continues to work with Pam to help with the disability process to secure funds and maintain their basic expenses moving forward. They are also helping them search for a car for transportation. St. Cecilia Vincentians are touched by many heartbreaking stories such as this

This Conference also hosts an annual Christmas Giving Tree program. Judy, an elderly lady who lives alone with no family, contacted them for help with food around Christmas. Vincentians delivered food to her home and asked if she wanted anything for Christmas, maybe something small like slippers. Judy politely refused, stating she was simply grateful for the help with groceries. St. Cecilia decided she deserved a small gift so they added her name to their Giving Tree. They gathered items for Judy and made a small gift basket that they delivered during a visit to her a few days before Christmas. She was overwhelmed, and through tears of joy, explained that she had not received a gift in years. She was so appreciative of St. Cecilia and their kindness. These small moments are how our Vincentians find the face of Christ in those thev serve.

St. Cecilia will be hosting an Invitation to Serve in September to invite parishioners to join St. Vincent de Paul. This Conference is very involved in their parish and helps with the annual Labor Day Festival held the weekend of September 3 this year. When you are a member of a conference you gain lifelong friends and feel a sense of belonging. We are grateful to all of our Vincentians who answer the call to serve our neighbors in need and invite others to join their local parish conference.

SUMMER BREEZE PROGRAM

"It's important that individuals who struggle to thrive during hotter weather have access to cool, clean air."

Our Summer Breeze Program, sponsored by St. Elizabeth Healthcare, is in its 24th year of impacted from seasonal changes, providing new AC units and fans to which can lead to hospitalization or neighbors of all ages suffering from other long-term effects. The summer heat and humidity in the tristate can exacerbate medical conditions for those who suffer from respiratory health issues. This partnership with St. Elizabeth Healthcare is important because it benefits those suffering from lifethreatening respiratory illnesses but cannot afford to purchase an air conditioning unit. "Every patient responds to the rising summer temperatures and humidity levels differently," said Dr. Chaitanya

Elizabeth Healthcare. "As a clinician. I often see patients negatively during hotter weather have access this is a healthcare disparity that is not often considered or addressed. The Summer Breeze initiative is quite literally saving the lives of our friends, family and neighbors."

Within the past year, there has been a substantial increase in the cost of AC units. Due to inflation, we anticipate an even greater need for air conditioners and fans this year among our neighbors who may not be able to absorb the rising prices for these items. We help economically disadvantaged clients with severe Mandapakala, a Pulmonologist at St. medical conditions stay healthy

and cool in their homes all summer

Last summer, we provided 285 AC units and fans, valued at \$17,000, to those in need. We could not offer this program without the financial support of generous donors and foundations like St. Elizabeth Healthcare and the Agnes Nordloh Charitable Trust.
