Message from Executive Director, Karen Zengel



Do you have a "drop everything and help" person in your life? That friend who has amazing time management superpowers and can be there in a pinch with a smile on her face? I am fortunate that I have found a few people over the course of my lifetime who have filled this role for me.

But, I try so hard to avoid asking for help. I should be able to figure it out on my own. I should be able to get it done myself. These two sentences generate flashbacks to the toddler years of my children. My husband and I heard "by myself!" so often. I guess I am not so different from a stubborn 3-year-old.

The truth is that we all need help sometimes. Friendship is an essential element of St. Vincent de Paul. Friendship is reciprocal, not unilateral. Friendship means that we can help but also ask for help.

I think of our Vincentians as "drop everything and help" people. Our Vincentians know that many of those we serve struggle to even ask for assistance. As a result, when the call comes in, they are quick to answer, arriving with a smile on their faces and peace and encouragement on their lips. We may not know these neighbors well, but we still extend a hand when a neighbor cries out in need. At our Centennial Mass a few weeks ago, Bishop Iffert described this as spiritual friendship to the poor.

Vincentians also depend on one another for help and support. This happens through sharing our experiences, our feelings, and our encounters with Christ through our service to our neighbors. We offer support and lift each other up in this bond forged through our service. Twinning is a very real example of friendship in action. We've heard often that conferences hesitate to ask for additional support when a request extends beyond their means. However, after discussion and prayer, the call for help goes out. And, guess what? The need is met, often within minutes.

All these people become a community of support, by God's design. They are visible representations of His love – one of many ways to remind us we are never alone. When we need him – and we will – all we need to do is ask for help. And, he's there. We just need to see him.

Thank you friends for all that you do as we support each other and answer the call to be a friend to our neighbors in need.

Message from Council President, Casey Guilfoyle



Dear Friends.

Two events from the past month of March are etched in my memory as the joyous fruition of "friendship" in our Society. Friendship is one of the three essential elements of our Vincentian Vocation and supports and strengthens the other two elements of service and spirituality.

The first etched memory is sitting in the pews of the "Old Cathedral" in St. Louis. I was in St. Louis for the Mid-Year SVDP National Meeting and enjoyed the short walk from where I was staying. The path, which was close to the famed "Arch", led to the site of the first

Cathedral west of the Mississippi dating back to 1764. What seemed even more special to me was that the very first and oldest chapter of our Society was founded on that spot in 1845. Before going, I did some digging on what this old Cathedral Conference was doing today and discovered that their focus was on the homeless that walked through the church doors. These neighbors are welcomed and invited for a prayer service where Vincentians share the gospel and reflect on Christ's words and also minister to them with material support. Sitting there celebrating mass with other early risers Vincentians, I felt a deep sense of unity with my fellow Vincentians, past and present, as we all find our own way to answer the call to serve Christ by serving those in need. The physical beauty of that small Cathedral was matched by the beauty of the kinship I felt with an entire legacy of Vincentian friends, past and present.

The second etched memory was formed at another celebration of the Mass just two days later as Vincentians from across the Diocese gathered at Blessed Sacrament Church to celebrate our Centennial with Bishop Iffert. Mother of God, Holy Cross and Blessed Sacrament parishes all founded their St. Vincent Conferences in 1923 and banded together to form a larger network of friends, our Council, that same year. Having worked on the Centennial Committee I had an appreciation for the history of how we evolved in the Diocese and the stories of past "friends" of the Society who dedicated themselves to this special ministry. I knew we had special friends in our ranks that day such as Fr. Reinke, Ed Whitehead, and the Lonnemann sisters, Carol and Andrea. So, as everyone sat in the pews alongside me and we sang together and prayed for our Society, I once again felt the beauty of friendship. Bishop Iffert's focus on having us as Vincentians rededicate ourselves to the "practice of spiritual friendship with the poor" inspired, uplifted, and energized all present. It's a mass I want to be etched in my memory as long as possible!

Our network of friends that we speak of in our mission includes this friendship with the poor, it includes the special bond of friendship within our conferences and within our Council, and indeed with Vincentians past and present. It extends as well to our volunteers, our dedicated staff, and our donors. Together, as friends, we will continue this legacy of service and friendship, and build the needed foundation to serve the future needs of our Society.

Conference Spotlight Mother of God

Founded in 1841 in Covington, KY, Mother of God Church became a staple of the city. On February 2, 1923, a St. Vincent de Paul Conference was established. Now, in 2023, the Mother of God Conference is one of three SVdPNKY parish conferences celebrating



a centennial birthday, marking 100 years of serving their neighbors in need.

With such a long-standing history of service, Mother of God Vincentians realize the importance of providing support to the community. Conference President, Gene Mayberry, humbly describes his experience at Mother of God Church.

"We have a very generous parish and volunteer team," says Gene. "We currently have 15 active Vincentians that are always looking for ways to be involved. Many of our Vincentians try to participate in the 'at-large' SVdPNKY activities and they are not hesitant to help outside of our region - like with CAP in Eastern Kentucky. We also have the blessing of experience, with Vincentians like Frances Wolf-Bertling having served for 20 years!"

Mother of God Vincentians serve in the heart of the Covington community, making their outreach both accessible and welcome. The ministry provides assistance to four senior assisted living centers and two homeless shelters, in addition to making five to six home visits per week.

True to the SVdPNKY mission, showing Christ's love is at the heart of the Mother of God Conference's outreach. For this reason, they are beginning to implement a new outreach for the sick and homebound.

"Just as our fellow Vincentians at other parishes realize, helping is more than financial assistance. It's about listening and understanding, about creating relationships, and letting our friends in need know that there is hope," says Gene.

For this reason, Mother of God Vincentians have begun implementing follow-up calls after home visits. Gene says this is important because, "it not only helps provide another way for Vincentians to become involved in the ministry, but it also provides continued outreach to ensure our neighbors in need realize we're not a one-time ministry. We're here to help and show Christ's love - we're here to serve as the hands of Christ."

Here is just one example of how Mother of God Vincentians serve as the hands of Christ and provide hope to neighbors in need:

Bill and his wife were each recovering from surgery and had fallen behind on rent payments. With both working in the fast food industry and the continued rising costs of living, making up the growing gap between what bills were due and personal funds available to make payments was becoming increasingly difficult. Facing an eviction notice, Bill reached out to Vincentians at Mother of God for help.

After meeting with Bill and his wife, the Vincentians assigned to assess his request realized that the need was in fact great, so they began the process of evaluating what Conference funds were available as well as other ways to assist. In the end, the Mother of God conference was able to secure partial funds and submitted a twinning request from Council, which was granted. They were also able to speak with Bill's landlord and helped Bill and his wife avoid eviction.

This is just one example of how Vincentians at Mother of God helped a neighbor in need. It is also an example that rings true throughout the 30 SVdPNKY parish conferences that support the Northern Kentucky community. 

Food Donation Drives

Food insecurity is a concern for many of our Northern Kentucky neighbors. An increase in the cost of food, rent, utilities, and other basic needs, and an end to SNAP emergency allotments in February have left many struggling to feed their families. SVdPNKY is partnering with area organizations that both understand and have a passion for fighting hunger in our community.





Hub NOKY is hosting an internal drive with their 1,400 employees to raise both awareness and donations for our food pantries. We are also partnering with the Boone County Sheriff's Office, the Campbell County Sheriff's Office, Campbell County Police Department, Kenton County Police Department, and Covington Police Department to host a food drive that covers three Northern Kentucky counties – Boone, Kenton, and Campbell. This drive that will be open to the public takes place the entire month of April. Donations can be made at any of the following locations:

Volunteering can be tough at times, but in the end, it is very rewarding in its own way and provides a sense of satisfaction. SVdPNKY is a place where we can do some good for the love of God.

Joe: SVdPNKY is a place that makes a difference in the lives of others. There was a pantry client whom I assisted frequently that had recently not been coming in. One day I ran into the client at a local grocery store where she was now employed and doing well. She was able to sustain her needs and did not need the pantry assistance. It was such a pleasure to see her and it was such a rewarding experience. To know that SVdPNKY had truly helped her gave me great happiness!

Tom: While there are many saints who provide inspiration and prayerful guidance to our daily lives, the legacy and works of St. Vincent de Paul are ongoing and shared daily through our ministry as we help to enrich the lives of others.
